UNRIVALED INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR FULL MEMBERS

Full Members of the Alliance receive superior Disability and Accidental Death insurance. Members are covered while performing any and all law enforcement, criminal justice and emergency response duties **on duty** or **off duty**.

Coverage includes:

Accidental Death — \$35,000 Maximum Benefit

Accidental Dismemberment — \$35,000 Maximum Benefit

Accidental Weekly Income Benefit \$200 weekly for up to 260 weeks (up to \$52,000) weekly accident indemnity. (This is in addition to any other disability or worker's compensation).

NOTE: Most departments and municipalities do not cover or insure reserve or auxiliary officers as unpaid, part time employees. This makes having some coverage essential to protecting your family. This coverage is available in most US States—see www.vleoa.org for policy details.

An Invaluable Resource

It is estimated that there are over 100,000 reserve and auxiliary officers in the United States, who volunteer thousands of hours of service to their communities.

Volunteers are an important and sometimes unnoticed part of the law enforcement community.

Who is a Volunteer Officer

A reserve officer is a person who derives their income in a field other than that of being a police officer. Reserve officers come from a wide variety of backgrounds and occupations including electricians, managers, business owners, engineers,

security professionals, airline pilots, nurses, accountants, and doctors. These are citizens who represent the fabric of their communities. The primary reason many choose to serve as volunteer officers is because they enjoy giving back to the community where they live and work. For many reserve officers, it results in a life

long commitment, for others it serves as an introduction to a career in law enforcement.

No matter the motivation, the result is that they usually pay for their own training, their own gear, and donate their time for free. In some communities they are fully trained, sworn and empowered while in other communities they have varying levels of police powers supported by different levels and intensity of training.

The legislation that supports the existence of volunteer police varies widely from state to state and country to country. By sharing information of what works and what does not – it allows volunteer law enforcement officers and agencies to learn from one another, and bring those best practices to the local level.
